

It was a midnight attack by Redcoats using sabers and bayonets. Called the "Paoli Massacre" because of brutal atrocities against wounded and captured Continental soldiers who were given no mercy and mutilated. Our Patriots vented their hatred and abhorrence with America's first battle cry – Remember Paoli! – striking fear in British troops from Germantown and Stony Point and beyond. Guides and displays will interpret that fateful night in 1777 at this National Historic Battlefield.

Parkesburg, named after prominent local landowners, was incorporated in 1872. However, it was the original site of the Fountain Inn, a colonial tavern and stopover for Lancaster farmers taking their livestock and produce to Philadelphia. Modeled after the prosperous European industrial towns, it was home to the Philadelphia and Columbia Railroad repair shops and the Parkesburg Iron Company. Observe the substantial revitalization in its commercial Italianate and Second Empire streetscapes.
