



June 12, 2008 WEST CHESTER: A RAMBLE 'ROUND MR. EVERHART'S GROVE

June 26, 2008 LIONVILLE HISTORIC DISTRICT: SOUTH VILLAGE AVENUE

Adaptive re-use is the main feature of the early residential and business areas of South Village Avenue. St. Paul's Lutheran Church with its 1813 barn will be utilized for refreshments and displays. July 10, 2008 **EAST PIKELAND:** HILL CHURCHES & CEMETERIES ON CLOVER MILL ROAD

This scenic hillside has been the site of a church since 1772, 236 years! Tradition says the first church was built on an existing Native American burial ground. The earliest white person's grave is dated 1690. Many early area settlers built and attended church and, as shown by the gravestones, lie buried here. Tours will feature the historic St. Peter's Lutheran Church and St. Peter's Pikeland United Church of Christ and the cemeteries associated with them.



July 17, 2008 MODENA: MODENA'S MODE **FAMILY**

Come see the historic borough of Modena located on the scenic West Branch of the Brandywine Creek. Named for the Mode family who settled here in the early 18th Century, Modena was once part of East Fallowfield Township. Our tour will focus on the history and personal stories of the Mode family, the area's tradition of milling and paper manufacturing and examples of the borough's Georgian to early 20th century style architecture. Come and learn about this hidden treasure!



July 24, 2008 **MALVERN:** WOMEN OF MALVERN

Come share the distaff side of Malvern Borough's history. Malvern women have cared for their husbands and children, jobs, churches, clubs, school, public library, Fire Company, businesses, and society from the 1830's to the present. Walk through the borough neighborhoods to see the varied architectural styles used for residences, such as the predominant Victorian, Edwardian, and Queen Anne. You can also find Gothic Revival, Sears bungalows, and postwar design. Also sprinkled throughout the Borough are period schools, churches, businesses, administrative buildings, a library, and the first firehouse.



July 31, 2008 HISTORIC MARSHALLTON VILLAGE

Join our tour of this nearly untouched village, named for botanist Humphrey Marshall (born 1722). Marshallton Village was an important stop on the Strasburg Road, a freight road from Lancaster to Philadelphia. Being a free road it was heavily traveled since Lancaster Pike was a toll road. There were 2 hotels in the village and 1 outside dating to 1765. Among the outstanding features of the village is a Quaker Meeting dating to 1722 (present building is 1765), a cradle factory, which made grain cradles and scythes, a blacksmith shop, pump maker, cigar factory, tinsmith shop, clothing store, bakery, and 1829 Methodist Church.



August 7, 2008 HISTORIC YELLOW SPRINGS: CHESTER SPRINGS SOLDIER'S ORPHAN SCHOOL DAYS

Step back to a time just after the Civil War and learn how the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania established schools for orphaned and needy children due to the casualties of war. Meet Eleanor Moore, the first woman principal in Pennsylvania, several of her charges, a teacher, and a Union Army veteran and member of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR). The tour will include the grand opening of Historic Yellow Spring's new Orientation Exhibit. The Victorian Dance Ensemble will be on hand to demonstrate the clothing, manners and dances of the mid-late 19th century.



August 14, 2008 THE MILL AT ANSELMA, A NATIONAL HISTORIC LANDMARK

Nestled along the Pickering Creek in Chester Springs, the Mill at Anselma is an extraordinary artifact of 250 years of Chester County's industrial heritage. Constructed in c. 1747 by Samuel Lightfoot, the Mill and the village of Anselma demonstrate how 18th century technology was adapted to serve the prosperity of the Industrial Revolution and the challenges of the Great Depression. Today, the Mill at Anselma connects visitors with Chester County's rich industrial and agricultural past through tours, flour milling demonstrations and its stone ground flour. A special milling demonstration will be offered the evening of the tour.



August 21, 2008 LINCOLN HIGHWAY & **POTTSTOWN** PIKE: CROSS-ROADS OF CHESTER COUNTY (1)

Tour three of West Whiteland's most prominent historical structures located on Lincoln Highway at the intersection of Pottstown Pike, the crossroads of Chester County. The resources, include the well-known Zook House (c.1754), the Guernsey Cow Dairy Barn (now the Downingtown National Bank) (c.1930) and Sleepy Hollow Hall (aka the Massey House (1717). Each property illustrates how effective adaptive reuse can both preserve and perpetuate historic structures in the face of significant development.
