### Adaptive Reuse – Where the Past Meets the Future in the Heart of Chester County!



Come walk in the footsteps of the Thomas Vickers Family who were renowned Quaker potters, abolitionists, and farmers. See how the historic circa 1770 house and bank barn are being preserved by Regal Builders, see actual examples of the Vickers 18th century pottery created on

site, and enjoy a display of vintage clay pipes like those once made there. Then, take a hayride through history to explore the neighboring farm where the original part of the house is circa 1750, built by early Quaker settlers - the Mendenhall family.

### Lecture: Historic Yellow Springs

### Celebrating the 250th Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence

July 4th, 2026, is the 250th anniversary of the Continental Congress declaring the independence of the American colonies from Great Britain. Throughout the year, Chester County will commemorate and celebrate the anniversary with a variety of community events and programs. The 2026 Town Tours and Village Walks program welcomes you to join us as we celebrate with an expanded season. The program, 13 Tours for the 13 Colonies, focuses on places, people, and events in Chester County that molded and defined the complex tapestry of history that shaped our nation.

Chester County, one of the three original Pennsylvania counties created by its founder William Penn, has a long and vibrant history. Established by Penn in 1682, the County offered rich soil for agriculture, flowing water to power mills, timber, and iron ore to support the growth of the colonial population. With its proximity to Philadelphia, an extensive road network developed, connecting the county to local and regional markets for its goods and raw materials. By the time of the Declaration of Independence, in 1776, the economy, the villages, farms, mills, and iron furnaces of Chester County were creating the foundation for the cultural and economic centers that we know today.

## Women & Minorities in Malvern



Malvern's identity was shaped by its women and minorities. Our tour will highlight just some of the many contributions of Black and female Malvernites since the 1800s, affecting our libraries, homes, banks, and a myriad of businesses. We'll learn more about the effective women's social groups and our industrious Black businessmen over the years.

## Barnard Station – Pocopson Township



Tour the historic Barnard homestead, an Underground Railroad station currently being restored by the Friends of Barnard Station, a 501(c)(3). The tour will present the abolitionist efforts of the Barnard family to

end slavery and help secure "the Blessings of Liberty" for all people. Additionally, the program will provide insights into 19th Century Pocopson history, agriculture and industry in the township, and the free Black population that called Pocopson home.

## Caln Township Historical Commission – 300th Anniversary of Old Quaker Meetinghouse



For 300 years (1726-2026) the Old Caln Meetinghouse has stood as a silent witness to our evolving nation, welcoming generations of Chester County Quakers from Caln Township and providing peace during periods of existential conflict. This tour will share the legacies of those

who frequented the Caln Meetinghouse – contextualizing daily life on the grounds of this 300-year-old landmark.

**Address & Parking:** 901 Caln Meetinghouse Rd., Coatesville. The Township will be closing a section of Caln Meetinghouse Road to provide street parking for those attending the Town Tour. Flaggers will be provided to ensure safe access to parking areas along the roadway.

## Radley Run Mansion House: A Journey Through Time




The 250-year-old Mansion House was in the path of soldiers marching to the Battle of Brandywine during the Revolutionary War. The Mansion House has served many purposes over the years, from a farmhouse, to an Underground Railroad Station, to a foxhunting

base. Today it remains a landmark for the Radley Run community for its beauty and educational value.

**Address & Parking:** 1100 Country Club Road, West Chester. Parking available in front of the Mansion or in the lot across the street.

## Lecture: When the Declaration of Independence Was News



Dr. Emily Sneff, an early American historian and leading expert on the Declaration of Independence, will present her book, *When the Declaration of Independence Was News*. It explores how the Declaration was communicated to people in the new nation and around the Atlantic world and reveals the stories of the many people involved in the process of declaring independence, from printers to soldiers to diplomats to translators.

## Primitive Hall, Ancestral Home of the Pennock Family



Primitive Hall, built by Irish immigrant Joseph Pennock in 1738, is a house museum that showcases 18th-century architecture and provides insights into the lives of early Chester County residents. Visitors will learn about the history of this prominent Quaker family and the Hall's 20th-century restoration.

**Address & Parking:** Primitive Hall, 830 North Chatham Road, West Grove (North Chatham Road is Route 841. The Hall is located on Route 841, between Routes 842 and 926, in West Marlborough Township. Parking will be on the lawn on the south and west sides of the Hall. The ground is level.

## Oxford Area Historical Association



The Oxford Area Historical Association invites you on a road journey of Dickey Family history in Oxford and the surrounding townships. For more than two centuries, the Dickey family made major contributions to the growth of southwestern Chester County. Onward from


1730, when the first Dickey arrived, they pioneered the use of improved farming methods, developed manufacturing centers, promoted modern transportation facilities, founded schools, a university, and led a host of social reform movements. Five members of the family became clergy, giving guidance to their neighbors. They set high standards for themselves as community leaders.

This self-driving tour will guide you by Dickey homes and farms, mills, schools, Lincoln University and enterprises.

**Address:** Driving tour starts at Oxford Area Historical Association, 119 S. Fifth Street, Oxford.

## The Mill at Anselma



Step inside The Mill at Anselma, a historic water-powered grist mill built around 1747 that once served local farmers in Chester County, known as the "breadbasket" of colonial America. Visitors will explore the history of the mill and its owners, see how early milling technology worked,

and learn how mills supported local communities and the Revolutionary-era food supply.

**Address & Parking:** 1730 Conestoga Road, Chester Springs. Follow the parking signs to the large field to the right.

## Kennett Square – A Hotbed of Social Reform



Kennett Square earned a lasting reputation as a center of social reform. Since the founding of the Anti-Slavery Movement in 1833, citizens of Kennett have been among its supporters. After the abolition of slavery, many redirected their energies toward women's suffrage and

the temperance movement, continuing the town's legacy as a hub of progressive change.

**Address & Parking:** Municipal parking garage, 120 E Linden Street, Kennett Square. The tour will start on the walkway outside the parking garage.
