
## Northern Struble Trail Feasibility Study

## Goals

To study extending the existing Struble Trail from Upper Uwchlan Township to Honey Brook Borough along the former Pennsylvania RR New Holland Branch rail corridor (13.5 miles). The study examines connections between Marsh Creek State Park, Springton Manor County Park, and Struble Lake as well as providing equestrian use recommendations for the corridor.

## Trail Feasibility

#### LEGAL FEASIBILITY

Based on title research of the former railroad corridor:

- In the Marsh Creek State Park Area the trail corridor is almost entirely owned by both Chester County and the Commonwealth of PA south and east of Marshall Road.
- In the Springton Manor County Park Area, the former rail corridor is privately owned from Marshall Road to the north end of Glenmoore Village. North of Glenmoore the corridor is owned by Chester County.
- In the Brandywine Headwaters Trail Area, Chester County owns the corridor within West Nantmeal Township.
  Within Honey Brook Township the corridor is fragmented between Chester County and private ownership.

#### PHYSICAL FEASIBILITY

Based on topography, hydrology, and adjacent land

- usfii the Marsh Creek State Park Area the former rail corridor is physically feasible towards development of a multi-use trail with equestrian use.
- In the Springton Manor County Park Area the former rail corridor is physically feasible for trail development south of Park Lane. The corridor within Glenmoore Village is not feasible since it has been dissolved by adjacent land uses and private development.
- In the Brandywine Headwaters Trail Area, the corridor within West Nantmeal Township is physically feasible for trail development. The corridor in Honey Brook Township is not physically feasible as it has been dissolved by adjacent land uses.

## Public Outreach

Public participation in this 18 month study included: 5 Public Meetings; 4 Study Committee Meetings; a study notification and survey mailed to 170 adjacent landowners; over 20 key-person interviews; and, 2 official township meetings.


## Landowner Outreach Survey

A mailing sent to 170 adjacent private landowners in March 2015 included the following survey question:

'Please indicate your general support for the development of a multi-use trail in your community.' The survey return rate was 35% (60/170) with the following results: Yes, I think a multi-use trail would be a great addition to our community (13); No, I do not think a multi-use trail would be appropriate for our community (21); Maybe, I would like to know more (17); and, did not answer (9).

## Proposed Trail Use

The 'Multi-Use Trail with Adjacent Bridle Path' cross section proposed for the segments to be developed illustrates the typical space required to accommodate for bicyclists, pedestrians, and equestrians within a shared trail corridor. Based on existing use counts, it is anticipated that the Struble Trail will have approximately 100,000 users annually.
